

11/22/63 by Stephen King (FIC KIN, cd FIC KIN, OverDrive e-book/audio book) - High school English teacher Jake Epping travels into the past—September 9, 1958, to be exact—under the identity of George T. Amberson. He's got one goal in mind: to prevent the assassination of president John F. Kennedy five years in the future.

The Age of Witches by Louisa Morgan (FIC MOR) - In Gilded Age New York, a centuries-long clash between two magical families ignites when a young witch must choose between love and loyalty and power and ambition, in this magical novel by Louisa Morgan.

American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins (FIC CUM, LP FIC CUM, cd FIC CUM) - Already being hailed as "a *Grapes of Wrath* for our times" and "a new American classic," Jeanine Cummins's *American Dirt* is a rare exploration into the inner hearts of people willing to sacrifice everything for a glimmer of hope. Ask Again, Yes by Mary Beth Keane (FIC KEA, LP FIC KEA, OverDrive e-book/audio book) - *Ask Again, Yes* is a powerful and moving novel of family, trauma, and the defining moments in people's lives. This book is so many things: a gripping family drama; a sensitive meditation on mental illness; a referendum on the power and cost of loyalty and a ripping yarn that takes us down into the depths and back up again. *

The Bad Seed by Jory John (JP JOHN) - A funny yet touching tale that reminds us of the remarkably transformative power of will, acceptance, and just being you. Perfect for readers young and old, *The Bad Seed* proves that positive change is possible for each and every one of us.

The Third Rainbow Girl by Emma Copley Eisenberg (364.152 EIS) - Emma Copley Eisenberg spent years living in Pocahontas, West Virginia re-investigating the brutal acts described in this book. Using the past and the present, she shows how the mysterious acts of violence have loomed over all those affected for generations, shaping their fears, fates, and the stories they tell about themselves. * ☺

Three Hours in Paris by Cara Black (FIC BLA, LP FIC BLA) - In June of 1940, when Paris fell to the Nazis, Hitler spent a total of three hours in the City of Light abruptly leaving, never to return. To this day, no one knows why. Cara Black brings her masterful knowledge of the city and its people to the Second World War and an imagined failed attempt on the life of Adolf Hitler by a female American sniper that leaves her fate and that of the war effort very much hanging in the balance. *

Undomestic Goddess by Sophie Kinsella (FIC KIN, OverDrive e-book) - Workaholic attorney Samantha Sweeting has just done the unthinkable. She has made a mistake so huge, it will wreck any chance of a partnership. Going into utter meltdown, she walks out of the London law office, gets on a train, and ends up in the middle of nowhere. How she takes a deep breath and begins to cope and finds love in this story is part of its charm.

The Way I Heard It by Michael Rowe (818.6 ROW, cd 818.6 ROW, OverDrive e-book) -

The Radium Girls by Kate Moore (363.1799 MOO, LP 363.1700 MOO, OverDrive e-book) - *The Radium Girls* fully illuminates the lives of young women exposed to the "wonder" substance of radium, and their awe-inspiring strength in the face of almost impossible circumstances. Their courage and tenacity led to life-changing regulations, research into nuclear bombing, and ultimately saved hundreds of thousands of lives. *

Running with Sherman by Chris McDougall (636.182 MCD, OverDrive e-book/audio book) - From the best-selling author of *Born to Run*, a heartwarming story about training a rescue donkey to run one of the most challenging races in America, and, in the process, discovering the life-changing power of the human-animal connection. Readers young and old will be fascinated and inspired by the journalist, *New Yorker* contributor, and children's book author who loved words his whole life. This authorized tribute, a New York Times bestseller, includes an afterword by Martha White, his granddaughter.

It is an encyclopedic tapestry of everything important and healthful for human nutrition.

If, Then by Kate Hope Day (FIC DAY) - Startling, deeply imagined, and compulsively readable, this debut novel is about the choices we make that shape our lives and determine our destinies. It is a literary masterpiece that asks us to imagine all the possible versions of ourselves that might exist . ☺

Last Day by Luanne Rice (FIC RIC) - The themes of love, loss, sisterly devotion, betrayals, and family ties are skillfully interwoven in this

The landscape and culture of this remote Australian territory are magnificently evoked as a story of family secrets unfolds.

Maid: Hard Work, Low Pay, and a Mother's Will to Survive by Stephanie Land (B LAN, LP B LAN, OverDrive e-book) - This book illuminates the struggles of poverty and single-motherhood and the ways in which our society is systemically designed to keep impoverished people mired in poverty.

The Man in the Red Coat by Julian Barnes (FIC BAR, LP FIC BAR, OverDrive e-book) - *The Man in the Red Coat* is a fresh and original portrait of the Belle Epoque with its heroes and villains, writers, artists and thinkers and a life of a man ahead of his time. Witty, surprising and deeply researched, the new book from Julian Barnes
